Speaker Donna Wright MS, RN, is best known for work on ensuring accountability and measuring competency, as well as her two books, *The Ultimate Guide to Competency Assessment and Relationship-Based Care*.

NURE 131 & NURE 132 Students' Spring 2016 Professional Education Day, is taking place on Tuesday April 5th, 8:00am - 2:00pm at The Westwood in Garwood, New Jersey. Presentations on legal issues in nursing, by Debbie Dolan, the Director of Risk Management at the Trinitas Regional Medical Center. She is a graduate from Seton Hall University of Health Law and Public Policy and is certified by the American Society of Health Care Risk Managers and the American Association of Legal Nurse Consultants. She has been appointed to the Union County Attorney Ethics Committee by the New Jersey Supreme Court.

Dr. Norma Bowe, has undergraduate degrees in Nursing and Community Health, a Masters in Health Administration and a Ph.D. in Community Health Policy. She began her career bringing medical care to rural areas in Fluvanna County, Virginia. She has also worked in the ICU, ER, and Hospice assisting with those patients transitioning from life to death and families experiencing loss and bereavement. Later she worked as a psychiatric nurse advocate for the mentally ill. Dr. Bowe is a tenured Professor in the College of Education at Kean University in Union N.J. She developed the course curriculum for *Death in Perspective* which has a three year waiting list and is the subject of the book *The Death Class: A True Story About Life*, by Erika Hayasaki a former LA Times journalist. Learning Simulation Center Attendance

The basics of the new LSC policy are the same. Students are expected to attend all scheduled skills practice or evaluation sessions at the Learning Simulation Center to become proficient in the nursing skills required in clinical practice. Cancellations, lateness and absences are a violation of the Trinitas School of Nursing Student Code of Conduct and can lead to a progressive disciplinary action up to and including dismissal from the program.

The changes made to the policy were done to make it clearer, easier to understand and enforce.

Absence is defined as a no show for a scheduled practice or evaluation session without notification of the Learning Simulation Center.

Cancellation is defined as canceling a previously scheduled skills practice or evaluation session at the Learning/Simulation Center.

Students with either an absence or cancellation will receive an official LSC Warning. The LSC warning will be signed by a member of the LSC staff and the student. (As with clinical warnings, a student's signature does not denote agreement, but only acknowledges receipt) LSC warning forms will be forwarded to the appropriate course/clinical faculty and placed in the student's school file.
